Dear SUSD Families,

Many of you are likely aware of concerns of racism raised in a recent Press Democrat article. We want to start by acknowledging that the perpetuation of racist stereotypes and biases has occurred in our schools. We pride ourselves on the fact that many of our families have chosen SUSD due to the diversity of our students and families that attend our schools. We deeply value your trust in our community.

We acknowledge that incidents involving racism and biases, as well as the way they have been addressed, have left families feeling unheard and devalued. We want to assure our community of our unwavering commitment to addressing instances of racism in our school community so that all students and families feel welcome, seen, and valued.

Racism has no place in our schools. California Education Code states that acts of racism, bigotry, and discrimination impede a student's fair and equal access to their education. Building a safe and welcoming environment for every student has always been our greatest priority. This takes all of us working together-teachers, staff, parents, and community members. As our children's educators- with you as their primary educator and SUSD as their secondary educator- we need to work together to interrupt racism and discrimination. At SUSD we are committedly working with our entire team to interrupt hate speech and behaviors that take away from the safe learning environments we want all of our students to thrive in. Resources from Teaching for Change can support your efforts at home.

Throughout the district, we have implemented numerous interventions and training aimed at directly confronting and addressing racism, as well as providing progressive education to further inclusion and understanding in our community. Among these efforts are:

- Development of an Anti-Bias Plan
- Anti-Racism Lessons facilitated by our district counselor
- Mobile Museum of Tolerance visit with 2 workshops per grade level 5th-8th grades topics included Anne Frank, Civil Rights, Combating Hate & The Power of Ordinary People.
- Challenge Day opportunity designed for participants to experience belonging, connecting across lines
  of difference and move toward creating the culture they want in their school for 7th & 8th grade
  students for the 25-26 school year.
- Expanded literary studies to include novels regarding racism, ethnicity, prejudice and belonging.
